1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Since its establishment in 1947, the Sree Kerala Varma College has always had as its prime priority in imparting of value-based education of highest quality with a vision to promote employability, innovative practices and research.

Affiliated to the University of Calicut, the curriculum is set by the university. What we strive to do within this preset framework, is practice effective and punctilious curriculum delivery which takes into account the diverse needs of all our students. The University of Calicut adopted the semester system for Under Graduate courses in 2009. All reforms to the pattern of the Choice Based Credit Semester System (CBCSS) have been timely implemented since then. Many teachers of our institution play important decisive roles in the formulation and implementation of the syllabi in their capacities as members of the undergraduate and post graduate board of studies and university syndicate and senate in different subjects of Humanities, Social Sciences and Sciences. The academic calendar of the college, which is compliant with the academic calendar of the University of Calicut provides the framework for effective curriculum delivery. Additionally, each department also has a separate academic calendar, which schedules PTA meetings, internal examinations, annual/semester-wise programmes of the departments and field visits or study tours. Copies of the syllabus and timetables are made available to all students at the start of each semester. Portions are allotted to the teachers according to their area of expertise before the commencement of every semester after a detailed discussion of the syllabus in departmental meetings.

Each teacher is directed to envisage a work plan and to keep a work diary related to this in order to ensure the effective delivery of curriculum. Along with the traditional methods of lecturing, teachers effectively make use of innovative and participatory methods of teaching including group discussions,

P.P.T. Presentations, assignments, seminars, workshops, field visits, projects and laboratory experiments. Every department of the college is provided with ICT and internet facilities for students and faculty for constant upgradation of knowledge. Invited lectures by distinguished scholars and retired members of the faculty are held regularly so that the students are able to benefit from their experience and exposure. All stipulations of the semester system—regular conduct of internal examinations, submission of assignments, the conduct of viva and seminar— are followed and implemented effectively. Remedial coaching is extended to slow and weak learners, and meritorious students are given institutional support through programmes like Walk With a Scholar, Scholar Support Programme and Additional Skills Acquisition Programme. Teachers are encouraged to adopt student-centered teaching practices in their classrooms with a vision to develop learner autonomy. Class teachers look into student needs, matters of student attendance, and progress of syllabus coverage. Infrastructural facilities in the form of smart classrooms, audio/visual aids, media room and well-equipped laboratories are made use of by both students and teachers. Periodical feedback is obtained from the students on aspects of teaching-learning. The IQAC of the college also collects feedback on curriculum delivery. Feedback Obtained

Feedback from all the different stakeholders is essential for the proper evaluation and uplift of any organization. For the purpose feedback forms are generated putting emphasis on the different service oriented areas of interest for different stakeholders. Apart from students' feedback, this year feedback from teachers, parents and alumni have been collected and analyzed. Student feedback is sought regularly in order to incorporate the needs and demands of the students in teaching and learning. Regular department meetings are held to discuss and develop action plans to address the concerns raised in the students' feedback. For students' feedback a questionnaire has been designed covering all the segments of the college into five broad categories like, Teaching and learning, Administrative office, Library, Extracurricular activities and overall matters to collect the Students' feedback on the above mentioned fields of their respective Departments as well as College. The suggestions and feedback of the stakeholders are considered for framing our infrastructure policies. The major sources of findings are UGC, PTA and the Management. The IQAC collects regular feedback, both structured and otherwise from all stakeholders of the college. The inputs by the students, teachers, nonteaching staff, alumni and other wellwishers of the college are analysed to review the future course of action to be adopted and the changes to be made in the current mode of functioning. 2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Mentoring is a true fulfillment of students' educational guidance by the faculty members of the college. Sree Keralavarma College offers a highly efficient Mentoring system through which a group of students consisting of 15 students are assigned to a faculty member at the commencement of the program. Mentors meet their students and guide them with their studies and extracurricular activities. They also provide advice relating to selection of majors, career guidance and personal problems. The catchment area of Sree Keralavarma College

is rural based and most of them come from very poor families, and many of them are first generation learners. They require a ready modulation in excess with their academic guidance. So every student is brought into mentoring system. More emphasis is given to the students with any Honours subject and each student is assigned to the academic guidance of a particular teacher of his/her department. The mentors share ideas, communicate knowledge to boost up confidence to the students. For programme students mentoring is done in group on a prescheduled day. It enhances the students' confidence and challenges them by setting higher goals, taking risks and ultimately guiding them to achieve higher levels, encourage Psychosocial support at the time of need, Students get an exposure to diverse academic and professional perspectives, and experiences in various fields . The ongoing relationship and mentoring is nurtured through phone calls, email contacts and social media groups. The mentors are also taking initiative to contact the parents to inform them about the academic performance of the students and ask them to attend the guardians meeting. Thus the mentor student relation is offering a homely guidance and encouragement. It helps to develop a mutual bond. Mentors communicate with fellow faculty and promote mentees at the time of difficulty / opportunity to help them develop further in their areas of interest. The institution preserves the records of final mark of each mentee and discusses with the students about their result for future improvement and intimates HOD and Principal and suggests if any administrative action is called for. The mentor maintains detailed progressive records and keeps reports of all discussion with students. Grievance Redressal Cell has been set up for listening and execution of complaints of students.

2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The University of Calicut has adopted a Choice Based Credit and Semester System (CBCSS) for PG and UG Programmes in all affiliated colleges. According to the system, internal marks for each semester amounts to 20 of the total aggregate score for each subject. Of the 20, 50 weight age is for internal examinations, 25 for attendance in each semester and 25 for assignments, viva or seminars. During the admission process itself, evaluation methods are communicated to the students and parents by way of prospectus, notices and departmental meetings. During orientation classes, the students are given a clear idea about the syllabus and evaluation procedure. The entire evaluation process involves class room evaluation, attendance, internal tests and assignments or projects as stipulated by University guidelines. Attendance registers are maintained for Main papers, Complementary Papers, General English papers and Second language. Internal assessment in college is so transparent that every student has a clear idea about the internal evaluation process of the theory amp practical subjects. Result Analysis is done by the class tutors after 5 every CIE Test. Pass percentage of each course is calculated by dividing the total number of students appeared and passed in each course. The performance of the students is monitored by the Principal and the necessary feedback is given to the concerned faculty members. The Principal conducts Review Meetings department wise to give necessary feedback for the improvement of students' performance. The senior faculty members appointed by the University act as the member of Board of

Studies and at every meeting they suggest evaluation reforms and discuss any discrepancy in the Passing Board meeting. The institution is keen on monitoring the performance of the students and reports to the Parents. Remedial Classes are conducted for the slow learners, absentees and the students who participate in Sports, NSS activities and Placement Interviews. This practice helps struggling learners to update their subject knowledge and helps them to catch up with their peers. Sree Kerala Varma College accommodates a sizeable number of students who are differentlyabled. Such students are given reasonable adjustments in case of submission of written assignments. They are encouraged to choose a mode that they are most comfortable with, viz. seminar or viva. External examinations of three hours duration will be conducted at the end of every semester for all the theory papers and practical papers. Projects and dissertation are guided by mentors assigned and evaluated externally. Students should satisfy the eligibility criteria of 75 attendance in each semester to appear for University Examination. The verified marks are uploaded to the University website within the stipulated time after the three tier verification at the Tutor, HOD and Principal levels respectively.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The College functions in accordance with the University of Calicut following all regulations and guidelines provided. Academic calendar is prepared by Principal, in consultation with HoD(s) and important cells. For this purpose an academic calendar mentioning holidays, teaching days, admission timeline, seminar/workshop slots, etc. in a semester is prepared at the beginning of the session and it is followed strictly except for unavoidable 6 circumstances from JuneMarch of each year. In the beginning of the academic session the students are apprised of academic calendar and same is uploaded on college website and displayed on notice boards and circulated to concerned department. . It provides plan for the academic year to students, teachers and parents. Considering the academic calendar, each department functions according to the teaching plan prepared at the department level. The framework of this calendar has provisions for tentative schedules for internal and end semester examinations and study leaves provided to students for the same. According to the schedule of the university we give notice of students' enrolment, class notice, internal assessment and internal assignments, registration, students' form fill up etc.. Each of the 17 departments in the college also has a separate academic calendar, which schedules PTA meetings, department level functions, and Department association events. The academic calendar helps in maintaining an order in the teachinglearning process. It would have been ideal if the calendar was inviolable. However, most of the schedules incorporated in the college and departmental academic calendars are tentative. This is because of the nature of the academic calendar of the University of Calicut. Any change in the university calendar in turn reflects in the college and department calendars. Often therefore, predecided events have to be shuffled and accommodated on different dates. Regular department meetings and council meetings, however, address this problem in an effective manner. Timetables and workload for teachers are set at the beginning of each semester and this is faithfully adhered to. Shortage of teaching faculty on account of leave or retirement vacancy is managed by special timetables and division of work, until a more permanent solution is found. In case of unwarranted holidays or loss of work days on account of hartals and bandhs, special classes are engaged before or after classhours or on weekends.

The college has ample infrastructural facilities for academic, cocurricular and extracurricular activities. There are seven academic blocks, one administrative block, five laboratories, two auditoriums, five seminar halls, an open stage and a stadium with modern facilities. There are sixty classrooms in total in the seven academic blocks and various departments also are housed in these blocks. The college has a well maintained, fully computerized library with open rack system to cater to the needs of the students and teachers. The library is set in a space with 1070 sq.metres. The library has a reading room, Reference section and internet facilities with broad band connectivity. The college has a well defined policy for maintaining the available facilities in the campus. The infrastructure policy of the college is in tune with the ethos of the green campus as well as the need of the times: sustainability and economy. The greenery and heritage of the college are maintained and all construction and renovation work is framed in such a manner. The funds for renovation and construction work in the college are allocated by the UGC, PTA, Welfare fund and Devaswom (management) fund. The UGC fund was utilized for construction of ladies hostel, renovation of toilets and tress work over various blocks. The Cochin Devaswom Board provides all support for the upkeep of the campus. Renovation and maintenance of the college is mainly under the supervision of Devaswom board. The college PTA is highly proactive and attentive to the needs and requirements of the institution. It also plays a pivotal role in the maintenance of various structures within the campus. The Alumnae have regularly been contributing to the maintenance and upkeep of the college premises. Over the years, they have contributed new equipment, facilities and monetary help for enhancing and modifying the available facilities on campus.

5.3.2 – Activity of Student Council & representation of students on academic & administrative bodies/committees of the institution (maximum 500 words)

The college has an elected Students' Union to officially represent all the students in the college. The Council is constituted as per the guidelines set by the University of Calicut. The Parliamentary system of election is followed and elections are conducted every year, under the close monitoring of the staff. All the students in the campus can cast their vote to elect a candidate. The dates for filing the nominations and the day of election are declared by the University. The college authorities ensure strict adherence to ethical practices during the entire process of the election. The elected body comprises 9 members: Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, General Secretary, Joint Secretary, Fine Arts Secretary, Student Editor, two University Union Councillors, General Captain for Sports and Representatives for each year Degree and PG Courses. The

two University Union Councillors represent the college at the University level. One faculty is nominated by the College Council as staff advisor to guide the activities of the Students' Council. The activities of the Students' Council start off soon after taking oath as office bearers. This is followed by Inauguration, Fresher's Day and Annual Arts Festival. The students' union of the college has been active in various important academic and extracurricular activities throughout the year. The activities of the Council include Annual College Day celebrations and organising and conducting numerous programmes including Film festivals, Drama fests, Book fairs, seminars and talks on relevant issues, awareness drives etc.. Major festivals are celebrated in the campus to foster communal harmony. Social and charity works are undertaken to nurture social responsibility among the students. The council actively associates with other cells in various activities. The council observes important days in association with the clubs of the college. The finance for the activities of the Union is met primarily from the Union Fund and also from the PTA. On certain occasions, the Council collects voluntary donations and spends for social causes. The college magazine, based on a specific and relevant theme, is a major highlight of the activities of the Students' Council. A separate editorial board with teachers from language departments and a staff editor, along with a team of student editors, helps the Magazine editor in the compiling of the magazine. The Students' Union is actively involved in the smooth functioning of the College and they represent the concerns of the students in the College Council through the staff advisor. In all the official functions of the college, a representative of the Council is invited to offer felicitations, thereby ensuring their representation and involvement in the events. They are also involved in selecting and training talented students for intercollegiate competitions and events.

Best Practices 1. POTHICHORU National Service Scheme is a community service programme sponsored by the Ministry of Education and Social Welfare, Govt. of India. The overall aim of National Service Scheme is to give an extension dimension to the higher education and orient the student youth to community service while they study in an educational institution. Presently there are two NSS units in Sree Kerala Varma (formed in 1985) namely Unit 41 and unit 162. Keeping this as mission, the Sree Kerala Varma NSS units planned and executed activities that could arouse the social conscience of the students, and to provide them an opportunity to work with the topic. It is a noble experiment in academic extension. Goal and Objectives Promote various adventure / society oriented activities among NSS volunteers. Infuse the sense of love, affection and sociability towards the various section of student community Find out and assist poor, marginalised, patients and elderly people Develop constant touch with the community. The practice Students of NSS Unit 41 and 162 are distributing "Pothichorru", free noon meals every Friday to homeless and hungry

in and around Thrissur district. It has been practicing from several years back. More than 150 meals are have been distributed every week. The NSS volunteers of our college distributed lunch packets in District Hospitals and Medical College in Thrissur for the poor patients. For that each student volunteer brought an extra packet of their lunch they prepared from home which were collected and given to those in need at the Thrisur City. Not only NSS volunteers but also the teaching staffs, nonteaching staffs and students also take part in this helping hand which has been going on for years back. The volunteers brought all the food to the college and then went to different places of Thrissur city. They distributed the food among poor people in footpaths, railway station, bus stand and other places where they reside. The NSS volunteers spent 4 hours for this task. We started the program at 9.30 am and completed it by 1.30 pm. Evidence of Success SKVC has managed to instill in our students the importance of believing in their abilities as well as living their dreams. While primary importance is given to the pursuit of education and performance in university level examinations, equal importance is also given to social service. This programme is beneficial for patients, their bystanders and homeless. The programme has been a great success. Photographs. 2. FLOOD RELIEF and CHITHRATHONI Objective To understand the nature and damages of issues due to flood in Kerala To provide moral support to flood affected victims To provide immediate relief to the flood victims The practice Monsoon was particularly heavy in Kerala 2018 year. The latest spell of monsoon began on August 8 and ended on August 16 brought rain 170 per cent above normal. This was also the time when Kerala floods wreaked maximum havoc. Incessant rains, floods and landslides rendered more than 7.25 lakh people homeless. Incessant rains and massive flooding has rendered thousands of people across the State of Kerala, India homeless. Hundreds of thousands of people are in Relief Camps. Monsoon rains continue to batter many districts of Kerala. The rains in Kerala state have resulted in large scale damage. The flood has severely affected the students of our college. Sree Kerala Varma College made an initiative to collect and study the flood affectees of our college. First stage Sree Kerala varma college flood relief collection centre was launched on 16/08/2018. Several people across the district have come forward to help flood victims residents who are trying to rebuild their lives after witnessing the worst floods of the state in distress and the resource for the same is gathered by voluntary donations from the public, teachers and students. This money in this fund is used only for disaster relief. Second Stage Field Visit Sree Kerala Varma College collected the details of flood victim students and had an interaction with them on during the first week of September. Following series of consultation and interactions, the decision was made to do a spot visit, to provide support (moral and material) in order to rehabilitate the students. After series of meetings at the department and college level, college advised the concerned department to conduct a pilot visit to the houses of victims. The departments formed a Rapid Spot Assessment team with teachers and visited flood affected regions of Thrissur district and distributed relief materials. All the houses situated in this village got flooded resulting in loss of House, household goods including foodstuffs, clothing and other articles. On the basis of the field visit and discussions, the department submitted the final report to the principal. The general body meeting of the college decided to assist the flood victims and selected two types of students fully damaged and partially affected. Altogether twenty three students were selected. They require special assistance for their rehabilitation in terms of supply of some basic requirements such as food, clothing and financial support. Efforts were made to provide basic amenities including house maintenance, stationeries, house hold articles, books and disburse grants to them as early as possible, so that the families concerned are able to take some steps towards their rehabilitation. Chitrathoni Sree Kerala Varma college formed a fund raising programme named "Chitrathoni. This was a fund raiser for the flood victims by way of the sale

of creative paintings of about twenty renowned artists. Comprising of three phases, Chitrathoni was organised as a part of the noble endeavour , Support flood affected Kerala varmans. Phase I of Chitrathoni was held on 29 September 2018 and it saw the convergence of the following famous artists, who brought out their creative best, in the lawns of Sree Kerala Varma College: Satyapal, K.U.Krishnakumar, Premji T.P., Anita T.K., Anto George, Martin O. C., Jibu P.B., E.N.Santhi, Jayasree P.G, Smija, Aparna and Jyohi Raj. Phase II of Chitrathoni was conducted on 11 October 2018 in collaboration with a group of mural painters from Guruvayur Devaswom under the leadership of Sri. K.U. Krishna Kumar. This enthusiastic group of artists showcased their fine art of skill as well as creative excellence to produce a variety of excellent mural paintings on canvas. Chithrathoni Exhibition The alumni association of students who studied in the college in the 1980s, Pulse 80, also joined hands in contributing to Chitrathoni. The president Smt. K.R. Beena and other office bearers handed over a set of paintings to the principal, Dr. Krishnakumari K. Phase III of Chithrathoni was an exhibition cum sale of all these paintings held on 22, 23 and 24 October 2018 at Kerala Sahitya Academy, Thrissur. Famous music director Sri Mohan Sitara inaugurated the programme on 22nd and poet Sri Balachandran Chullikkad inaugurated the closing ceremony on 24th. Besides these, cadets and volunteers NSS and NCC units of SKVC actively engaged in flood relief activities. Evidence of Success The programme was a great success and received wholehearted support from all sections of Kerala society. Sree kerala Varma College has distributed relief materials to flood affected families and relief camps in the Thrissur district. The six days relief camp organised by the SKVC community in the college benefitted around 600 flood victims of local residents and rest of Kerala society. The material collected at the college was distributed to other relief camps in Thrissur and rest of Kerala. NSS and NCC volunteers and cadets actively engaged in the post flood relief activities like house, well and street cleaning. Selected students were given financial assistance.
